

Applications Available for Co-op Board of Director Candidates

eeker Cooperative, as a member-owned organization, has a board of directors elected by its membership. Directors are elected from each of Meeker's nine districts. In 2020, director elections are scheduled in Districts 1, 2, 5 & 6

The following townships are included: **District 1**

· Roseville, Irving in Kandiyohi; Paynesville in Stearns; Union Grove in Meeker.

District 2

Eden Lake in Stearns; Harvey, Manannah in Meeker.

District 5

·Fairhaven in Stearns; Cokato, Southside, French Lake in Wright; Dassel in Meeker

District 6

· Harrison, Kandiyohi, Gennessee, Fahlun, Lake Elizabeth, E. Lake Lillian in Kandiyohi; Cosmos, Acton, Danielson, Swede Grove in Meeker; Brookfield, Boon Lake in Renville.

The District 5 seat is up for election as there had been no candidate for the seat in 2019. The Board of Directors called for candidates as described in the Bylaws and appointed a member to fill the seat until the next Annual Meeting. That seat will be up for election again in 2022 during its normal rotation.

Any member in the districts identified above that is interested in being placed on the ballot and meets the qualifications identified in the Bylaws must submit a completed Meeker Cooperative Application for Director Form by close of business on November 25, 2019.

All potential candidates must declare their intention to be placed on the ballot by submitting a completed application as described and be declared qualified for placement on the ballot by the Oualifications and Election Committee. No write-in candidates shall be deemed valid.

The Bylaws state that the Board of Directors shall appoint a Qualifications and Election Committee (Q&E Committee) consisting of one Member from each of the Director Districts which is not up for election. It shall be the responsibility of the Q&E Committee to review all applications submitted and to determine that all candidates meet stated qualifications.


The Committee will notify any potential candidate that does not meet the qualifications and allow seven (7) days for the candidate to comply with said requirements. The decisions of the Q&E Committee will be final.

The Committee will have the authority to place qualified candidates on the ballot for election, and for any district in which there is only one candidate, waive the ballot process and declare the candidate elected

The Qualifications & Election Committee shall prepare and post at the principal office of the Cooperative at least seventy-five (75) days before the meeting the list of qualified candidates for Director elections for each Director District up for election. If no Member from a district up for election is placed on the ballot, said position shall be deemed vacant following the annual meeting and the Board of Directors may appoint a Member from said district to fill said position until the next annual meeting and election of directors.

ith the holidays approaching, I'm starting to think about unique gifts for my family and friends that won't use too much energy. Can you share any ideas?

Dear Monica: It's always a great idea to give energy efficient gifts! Here are a few ideas based on a range of prices. You might even want to keep one or two of these for yourself!

- 1. Smart power strip. Price: \$15 to \$100:

 Smart power strips are the perfect gift for your tech-savvy family members and friends because they'll likely need the extra outlets for their many devices. Smart power strips give more control than traditional ones. By plugging the main hardware item, such as a computer or monitor, into the master outlet, you can easily control the rest of the devices. When that main device is turned off, everything else plugged into the strip also powers off. Some smart power strips can also be operated through a remote control or smartphone app, and some include programmable timers.
- 2. Smart thermostat. Price: \$30 to \$600: A smart thermostat can adjust the temperature by learning your energy use habits over time, which saves you money and keeps you more comfortable. It can also be controlled through a smartphone app. Just make sure you're going to use all of its functionality before taking the leap.
- 3. **Solar backpack**. Price: \$30 to \$325: Walking or biking to the office, the field or a mountain lake? It may sound crazy, but you can actually make the most of the sun's energy with a solar backpack. These handy devices collect and store enough electricity to power a phone, tablet or even a laptop. The solar panels stitched onto the back of the packs are flexible and waterproof. Best of all, they have all the features and functionality of their traditional non-solar cousins.

- 4. **E-bike**. Price: \$250 to \$9,000: Electric bikes, or e-bikes, are regular bicycles with an electric motor that can be engaged as needed. E-bikes are becoming increasingly popular with people who face challenging terrain, bike to work and don't want to work up a sweat, or perhaps find regular cycling too physically challenging. Studies also show that e-biking can bring many of the same physical benefits as non-assisted pedaling. They even come in foldable versions. One downside is they are heavier than regular bicycles.
- 5. **Electric scooter.** Price: \$80 to \$3,000: The \$49 foldable, foot-powered scooter that exploded onto the scene a decade ago has grown up in a big way. In some larger cities, electric scooters are now available to rent at various locations, found and paid for via an app. Or you can buy one to use for your daily commute or as a fun way to simply scoot around the neighborhood. Higher-quality versions will have longer range, larger tires and better suspension along with

- a higher cost, of course. The catch is that they're still largely confined to paved surfaces.
- 6. Energy efficient tablets. Price: \$40 to \$4,000: You may already have at least one tablet in your home, but have you considered how energy efficient it is? Try this: Instead of using your TV to binge that new show, consider an ENERGY STAR-rated tablet, and you can use seven times less power! Simply look for the ENERGY STAR label when you're shopping for new tablets.

Looking for an efficient gift that costs practically nothing? Enjoy a good book and a cozy evening at home, which requires no energy use at all. Don't forget to put on your favorite sweater and pair of fuzzy slippers so you can lower the thermostat a couple of degrees. Now that's an energy efficient evening worth repeating!

LEDs changing the future of lighting in the U.S.


If you haven't committed to using LED lighting in your home and/or small office, here are some reasons to take another look.

esidential LEDs -- especially ENERGY STAR rated products - use at least 75% less energy, and last 25 times longer, than your regular light bulb. That translates to changing your incandescent bulb 25 times for every one LED bulb change. If you hate changing light bulbs and the waste that is generated by throwing 25 bulbs away, then an LED is the right bulb for you.

The U.S. Department of Energy estimates that widespread use of LED lighting has the "greatest potential impact on energy savings in the United States." By 2027, they say that widespread use of LEDs could save about 348 TWh (terrawatt hours) of electricity compared to no LED use. This is the equivalent annual electrical output of 44 large electric power plants (1000 megawatts each), and a total savings of more than \$30 billion at today's electricity prices (www.energy.gov).

The brightness, or lumen levels, of the lights in your home may vary widely, so here's a rule of thumb:

To replace a 100 watt (W) incandescent bulb, look for a bulb that gives you about 1600 lumens. If you want something dimmer, go for less lumens; if you prefer brighter light, look for more lumens.



Maybe you've already made the switch to LEDs in your home. But how about switching your traditional Christmas lighting for LEDs? Did you know that LEDs are:

Safer: LEDs are much cooler than incandescent lights, reducing the risk of combustion or burnt fingers.

Sturdier: LEDs are made with epoxy lenses, not glass, and are much more resistant to breakage.

Longer lasting: The same LED string could still be in use 40 holiday seasons from now.

Easier to install: Up to 25 strings of LEDs can be connected end-to-end without overloading a wall socket.



You can save even more by setting a timer for outdoor lighting and decorations. Program the timer so the lights turn on in the evening and turn off later at night when you typically go to sleep.

Digging Into Smart-Home Research in South Dakota

partnership between NRECA and a South Dakota co-op to develop a utility-connected home took a big step forward this month as Dakota State University launched a Connected Home Research Project at its Cyber Labs center.

The university, a national leader in technology and cyber security education, is collaborating with NRECA and East River Electric Power Cooperative in Madison (one of Meeker Co-op's power suppliers) to create a "home hub" that would allow the growing number of smart devices in consumers' homes to communicate with co-ops to save energy and money.

"From WiFi thermostats to smart appliances, our network of electric cooperatives is seeing increased adoption of smart-home technologies among consumers," said Chris Studer, chief member and public relations officer for the generation and transmission co-op, which provides 25 member co-ops with wholesale power in eastern South Dakota and western Minnesota. As part of the TechAdvantage Expo at the annual meeting, NRECA set up a model of a utility-connected home, featuring wireless doorbell cameras, keyless door locks, security sensors on the windows, a thermostat controlled by a smartphone app and other smart devices.

"As use of smart-home technology continues to increase among consumers, we're hoping to use this research project to identify technologies that will help us in our transition to a new energy management future," Studer said. The project's research space at the university's new Madison Cyber Labs center—also known as MadLabs—looks like a smart-home kitchen. It features other smart products, including lighting, window coverings, home security, a washer and dryer, and a water heater. Researchers will likely add more technology to the lab as the project progresses, including an electric vehicle charger and smart locks.

St. Cloud to get electric vehicle charging stations

he St. Cloud City Council last night voted unanimously to install electric vehicle charging stations in town. Public Services Director Pat Shea says the stations will come at no cost to the city. The money to build the four-space charging station will come from a legal settlement between the state of Minnesota and Volkswagen. Customers who use the stations will have to pay for the electricity themselves.

There are several charging station locations up for discussion along Highway 10 and Interstate 94. Council Member Dave Masters says he's glad that St. Cloud is getting the charging stations as the market for electric vehicles increases.

Paul Bugbee becomes a Credentialed **Cooperative Director**

aul Bugbee, a Cooperative Director from District One, recently received certification as a "Credentialed Cooperative Director." This educational opportunity is presented by NRECA (National Rural Electric Cooperative Association) and is the first part of a three-part Director Education Program available to all cooperative directors in the nation.

The Credentialed Cooperative Director (CCD) program consists of five courses that focus on basic governance knowledge and the essential skills required of cooperative directors. The CCD prepares directors to fulfill their fiduciary duty as elected officials serving on behalf of their membership. Upon completion of all five CCD courses, directors are awarded the Credentialed Cooperative Director Certificate by NRECA.

Once the CCD is completed, participants can then pursue the Board Leadership Certificate.





ttaching deer stands to utility poles is never a good idea. But did you also know that having deer stands underneath high-voltage transmission lines is also a no-no? That's because it puts you at risk and can make you (and your neighbors') lights flicker or cause power reliability issues?.

"We take care to remove dangerous trees, items and objects in our rights of way," said Craig Poorker, land rights manager for Great River Energy. "Deer stands in our easements are a safety hazard."

Great River Energy, one of Meeker Cooperative's wholesale providers of electricity, works with the North American Electric Reliability Corporation to adhere to standards for operating and maintaining power lines. If found in violation of any standards (including deer stands in rights of way), Great River Energy can face fines in the millions of dollars.

Some reasons why deer stands and other building aren't allowed in rights of way include:

- The structure may interfere with access to the line for maintenance and emergency repairs.
- · A fire in the stand within the easement area could damage the transmission line. Location #06-26-201
- It may be closer to a line than electrical codes allow.

If you have a deer stand near a transmission line, please remove it and hunt from the safety of the woods.

hen leaving home for an extended length of time, turning off the water heater and the water supply to your home is a good idea. But not all good ideas are simple tasks.

Several Cooperative Members with dual fuel heating systems turned off the breaker to their water heater while they took extended trips to warmer climates. Instead of saving them money, however, it led to higher electric bills. Location #28-33-413

Quite often, the off-peak meter is wired to the same breaker as the water heater and, without knowing it, these members may have turned off the power to their energy management (EM) meter and EM controls. If this was the case, any electric heat used by the off-peak electric heating equipment is uncontrolled and billed at the general service rate rather than the off-peak rate. The result is a higher electric bill. To prevent this from happening, Meeker Cooperative encourages you to complete this simple test of your dual fuel space heating system.

- 1. Turn on the electric dual fuel space heating system.
- 2. Turn off the breaker to your water heater.
- 3. Check to see if the off-peak or EM meter is running and registering energy used.
- 4. If the EM meter is not running, the water heater breaker is the power source for the EM control equipment and the EM meter. If this is the case, you must contact your electrical contractor and request that a disconnect be installed near your water heater. This will allow you to shut down your water heater while maintaining power to the EM equipment and meter.
